## **MEAT QUALITY ASSURANCE (MQA)**

Meat Quality Assurance Training for 4-H/FFA members consists of walk-through learning stations and a test. The training is required for all members who are enrolled in livestock projects.

Lincoln County 4-H & FFA Members will be required to complete MQA as follows:

1x-First year taking a livestock project

1x-When the member turns 4-H age of 10

1x-When the member turns 4-H age of 14. \*FFA members must attend as well their first livestock project year when showing in FFA.

## 4-H PROJECT/FORMS REMINDERS & UPDATES

**Project Books/Manuals & Updated Information:** Families will need to order project books/manuals directly from the supplier. Go to Colorado 4-H @ co4h.colostate.edu/program-areas/colorado-4-h-project-information/ and then click on "publication order form" to see where to download or order.

\*Check for updated publications including for your project. Not all projects require a manual.

### State 4-H Project Resource Updates:

- -Leathercraft-> An updated manual is posted along with several new "Instructional" Videos on different techniques and unit areas.
- -Photography-> Unit 5 has a new manual for this year.
- -Foods-> Updated Manuals for Cultural & Ethnic Foods & Passport to Foreign Cookery are out.



## FAIR RELATED: UPDATES (Cont.)

From the Lincoln County Livestock Sale Committee "To keep Lincoln County's state identification method standard across all species, we will be implementing county wide tags for all market livestock exhibited at the Lincoln County Fair. To accommodate this and the desire for our youth to be able to participate in the rate of gain class for swine, sheep, goats, and beef, we will be hosting a county weigh in date on Saturday, May 4<sup>th</sup> from 8AM to 11AM for sheep, goat, and swine. If a family does not wish to participate in the rate of gain class, they will still be responsible for attending the weigh-in to get the county identification tags in their animals. We know that there will be conflicts with other events, so please utilize your 4-H family to get your show animals tagged. If you have any questions, please contact Emily Baylie or John Thompson."

- Market Sheep/Goat/Swine (2024 Change for Weigh-in & Tagging) -All Sheep, goats, and swine will be required to get tagged on Saturday, May 4th (8:00-11:00am) & weighed (if participating in the rate of gain contests). This replaces the nomination process and forms utilized the past couple of years. Animals do not have to get off the trailer to be weighed, but they do have to be tagged that day to be eligible for entry at fair.
- <u>Rate of Gain Contests</u> will be available for (Beef, Sheep, Goat, and Swine) in 2024. Members must have their animal weighed in at the respective Tagging/Weigh-In date and submit class entry on their fair entry form to be eligible for the contests.
- <u>Sheep (Market Class Addition)</u>->Miniature Sheep (Weight range 60-99 lbs.) per the recommendation from the sale committee. Declare at Tagging.



# SAFETY StepUP: FIREARM & BOW MAINTENANCE & PRODUCT PURCHASE AWARENESS

### **Know Before You Go:**

When you are considering equipment purchases or need to have maintenance work completed, it's important to do some research to find the best provider you can.

- -Ask for references from trusted friends and family about who they might recommend or know.
- -Do they have a Federal Firearms License (FFL) to buy or sell firearms legally?
- -Are they accredited by the Better Business Bureau and have a good rating?
- -Do they provide warranty or guarantees on their services and/or products?
- -Do they provide written, itemized estimates before completing any work?
- -What and how do they charge for services?
- -Do they have equipment that you one can try out before purchasing?
- -Do they have the equipment in stock or will it need to be ordered?
- -Check out their online reviews and see if there are any patterns of good or bad.

## Consider these factors and more before purchasing equipment for youth to help best determine needs:

- -When is the equipment needed by?
- -Person's age, height, and size
- -What's appropriate for their current height and size?
- -Will the piece of equipment work for them as they grow older if they are a youth?
- -Does the equipment meet rulebook discipline specifications if they are participating in 4-H or some other type of club or event.
  - -What else will the bow or firearm be utilized for (i.e., hunting, fun shoots, etc.)?
  - -What level of involvement and interest does the individual have (i.e., 1st yr. vs. 6th yr.)?
  - -Do we need to purchase equipment and how much can we afford to spend?
- -Individual comfort and proper fit are important. It's important not to follow trends or make a purchase just because a friend has it.

Safety is #1-> No Matter What! Whether you are hauling a firearm/bow to the shop or working on them at home; SAFETY Matters.

- -Never handle or work with firearm/archery equipment without an adult present or under impairment.
- -Always ensure firearms are not loaded, have a Clear Bore Indicator (CBI) in place, and that the muzzle is always pointed in a safe direction.
- -Always ensure firearms/bows are transported in a secure transport case. Call ahead to the shop to let them know you will be coming in. Find out what their specific drop-off/appointment protocols are for handling and transfer of equipment.
- -Ensure that no ammunition or arrows are present when working on firearms/bows. If working on arrows, ensure no bows are in the working area and are locked up for safety.
- -Utilize a sturdy working table away from other activity areas and individuals in the house.

# SAFETY StepUP: FIREARM & BOW MAINTENANCE & PRODUCT PURCHASE AWARENESS (cont.)

- -Ensure there are no distractions in the working area (cell phone texting; television; friends or siblings; food, etc.).
- -Ensure the working area is well-ventilated.
- -Before starting, read through your owner's manual and ensure you have the proper equipment for cleaning and repair for your specific firearm or bow.

### Maintenance is Key!

Proper maintenance and cleaning of your firearm and bow helps provide longevity of the equipment; ensure optimal performance; and increase the safe use of the equipment. It's important to read the manufacturer's instructions as each piece of equipment is different. Maintenance (preuse) checks should occur before going out to shoot. Cleaning and (post-use) equipment inspection should occur after each use.

**General Repair & Maintenance Items/Supplies to Consider:** \*\*Supplies or equipment needed will vary per discipline and model. Work with an experienced professional before conducting any home maintenance or cleaning.

### St. Patrick's Day Slime- Delish.com

### Supplies:

- -5oz. Clear Glue
- -1/4 cup Water
- -1tsp. Baking Soda
- -1tbsp. Eye Contact Solution (with borate)
- -Green Food Coloring
- -Gold Glitter
- -Mixing Bowl
- -Spoon
- -Table cloth covering or wax paper to lay slime out on or play with.

### Steps:

\*Work with an adult for permission before beginning or if you need assistance. Also don't forget to wash your hands before and

after the project.

-Add the glue and water to the bowl and mix. Stir in drops of food coloring (until you get the color tint that you want). Also add in some glitter.

-Add the baking soda and contact solution. Once it is thickened, knead it with your hands until it's no longer sticky. Then you are ready to play with your slime!

-Be sure to store your slime in a plastic container with a lid and make a new batch after a few days or if any signs of mold growth appear.
