LIVESTOCK SHOW & CLIPPING EXPERIENCE

Practice is the best way to gain experience and hone your livestock showing and clipping skills whether you are brand new to showing or a seasoned participant. There are many ways to increase you skills and knowledge around showing livestock. Consider the following to get started:

- -Work with your animals daily to practice showing and giving them exposure (i.e. loading into the trailer, loud noises, multiple people, using the clipping stand or chute, washing, etc.).
- -Practice clipping on a non-project animal if available or in small stages early in the summer so there is time for adequate grow back.
- -Enter a local jackpot show to get experience showing for you and your animal (*Check out the newsletter and Facebook page for many opportunities).
- -Watch fellow youth as they fit and show at a local jackpot or another fair to see different techniques and better understand what judges may be looking for in market and showmanship classes.
- -Take your animals to a fellow 4-Her's house to practice showing with someone else and to expose your animals to different environments and noises (*Remember good biosecurity practices).
- -Connect with your project leader or ask for mentor resources from your club or extension office.

National 4-H Congress:

The <u>National 4-H Congress</u> is Friday, November 29 - Tuesday, December 3 in Atlanta, Georgia. Youth attending must be at least 14 and not more than 19 on January 1 of the year that they attend National 4-H Congress. National 4-H Congress is a once in a lifetime experience. Youth may only attend National 4-H Congress one time unless they are chosen to be a member of the National 4-H Congress Design Team. Part of the event includes dynamic speakers, a selected tour, and participation in a community service project in the Atlanta metro area.

The cost for the trip is dependent on the number of 4-H members that attend from Colorado. The range is from \$1900 to \$2300.

4-H members interested in being a delegate must submit an application packet by July 1 to <u>lisas.sholten@colostate.edu</u>.

Application Packet Items to Include:

- Resume of skills and experience (school, 4-H, extracurricular, work, etc.)
- Cover letter that includes:
- Your express interest in this trip
- o Your leadership, community service, or unique ways you've helped others.
- o Letter of recommendation from your 4-H specialist/coordinator/director.
- o Finalists will be selected for interviews and asked to present on this topic (under five minutes) during their interview: *Describe how you use your head, heart, hands, and health as described in the* **4-**H *pledge to better your club, community, country, or world.*

Applicants will be notified by the selection committee. Once the selection is made, delegates will need to complete a registration form, health form, and code of conduct form.

ANIMAL CORNER: BIOSECURITY & SHOWS

Before Events:

- -Ensure required vaccinations are current.
- -Check state requirements for brand and health inspection requirements for movement.
- -Create a traveling folder to store brand and health papers; pictures of livestock; and contact information including your local veterinarian and state contacts.
- -Clean and disinfect trailers, equipment, and tack.
- -Examine animals for any signs of illness or disease and take their temperature.
- -Take clean clothes and shoes so as not to spread contaminants from your place to others.

At Events:

- -Tie animals on opposite sides of the trailer from neighbors.
- -Use solid barriers or keep an empty stall between livestock.
- -Avoid nose to nose contact with other animals.
- -Limit access from the public and dogs.
- -Avoid sharing equipment or feed.
- -Avoid community water tanks and contact on the bucket with the end of the hose.
- -Properly dispose of manure and trash.
- -Utilize insect repellants.

After Events:

- -Disinfect all equipment, tack, and trailers.
- -Keep manure and trash disposal away from animals after returning home.
- -Isolate returning animals to the home property for a minimum of 14 days.
- -Take animals temperature and monitor for illness.
- -Create and update a log of all events attended including: locations stopped at; date; and contact information in case of a disease outbreak.
- -Wash all clothing and shoes from the event before working with home animals.

SAFETY STEP-UP: SUMMERTIME & SNAKES

Warm weather means that snakes are actively out and about. It's important to be aware of your surroundings when outside on the farm, in your backyard, at the park, pool or lake, or even the mountains. Snakes like to hide in cool, damp locations and prey on small rodents and insects. Normally we have less moisture as the summer goes on and this means snakes will come in closer to find additional water sources.

<u>To make your yard less inviting to snakes:</u> remove tall vegetation; control rodents and insects; remove water sources in the yard area; remove rocks with large overhangs in the yard; and seal up cracks in buildings or foundations.

<u>If you see a snake:</u> avoid going in it's direction; stop and very slowly back away; and defend yourself only if necessary.

<u>When out & about:</u> wear pants, high-top closed toed shoes, and gloves; avoid picking up objects or rocks with your hands; check where you are walking or sitting; and remember that snakes do go in the water.

<u>Potential signs of a snake bite:</u> Labored breathing; disturbed vision; increased sweating/salivation; numbness/tingling around face or limbs; vomiting; redness or swelling, etc. Many of these symptoms would also apply to livestock and pets as well. *While many snakes are not poisonous; it's always better to call poison control or contact your nearest hospital for information if you were bitten by a snake or think you might have been. Also try and take a picture of the snake, if it's safe to do so, to take to the hospital (or your local veterinarian if an animal was bitten)

What to Do if Bitten by a Snake (According to the CDC):

- -Keep calm, avoid anything strenuous, and do not elevate the bite area/limb above the heart
- -Wash the bite area with warm water and soap and cover with a clean/dry dressing
- -Immediately seek medical attention (hospital) or dial 9-1-1
- -If a pet or animal is bitten by a snake keep them calm, confined to a small area, and contact your local veterinarian for treatment information.

- Project Assistance-If you need assistance with your 4-H Projects, please contact the office or your club leader to help connect you with volunteer project leaders and other resources.
- 4-H/FFA Hoof Trim (Beef & Dairy Cattle) is June 28 at Eastern Colorado Veterinary Services in Limon. The cost is \$40/head. Limited spots available. RSVP due by June 21 to chris-tine.schinzel@colostate.edu for a time-specific slot. *A reminder that you are responsible for paying for hoof trimming slots even if you no-show on the RSVP after the deadline.
- State Fair Sheep, Goat, Swine Nominations-Members interested in taking animals to state fair will need to notify the office to receive a state fair nomination form and turn it back in no later than June 1. DNA packets must be ordered online @ coloradostatefair.com/livestock/ in time to receive and ship back to state fair by their stated deadlines. An actual entry form must also be submitted to state fair online (this is not the same as the nomination form or DNA packet). Refer to the Colorado State Fair for all policies and deadlines.

Fair Related-> The County deadline is July 1 for (Dog and Horse ID's, Rabbit and Poultry Nominations, Livestock & General (all entries) Projects, and Fashion Revue) fair entries. The fairbook will be online @ lincoln.extension.colostate.edu/lincoln-county-fair/. Open Class entries have other deadlines. Refer to the fairbook for exhibition requirements in all areas.

Fair Related (cont.)

- -> The fairbook will be available in hard copy later spring and online @ <u>lin-coln.extension.colostate.edu/lincoln-county-fair/</u>. Be sure to read the schedule carefully for show and event dates & times (some have changed).
- -> Fair Entry Forms-All entry forms for 4-H and FFA (Animal & General Projects) will be done online via the *Blue Ribbon* program, so those forms will be turned in that way and not on paper forms at all. We just got access to Blue Ribbon that was updated. We will have days that 4-H families can come into the office and fill out their online entry forms with help from Kendra in June or to utilize the internet
- -> Market (Poultry & Rabbit) Fair Nomination Forms for fair are due July 1. Forms can be accessed from our website @ lincoln.extension.colostate.edu/4-h-forms-applications/ under the "fair tab". Members need to pick up poultry bands from the office (there is a tool available for application) and rabbits also need to be tattooed by that date. *Members interested in taking (poultry and rabbit) animals to state fair will need to notify the office to receive a state fair nomination form. State fair nomination forms are due no later than July 1 to the office for signatures. State Fair entry information on all species will be available at coloradostatefair.com/livestock/.
- -> Dog and horse ID's for county fair are due July 1 (You must submit your Id's to coopext_lincoln@mail.colostate.edu after May 1 as 4H Online locks for this). Livestock & general project fair entries will be due July 1.
- -> A horse may be ID'd/shared as a project horse by no more than 2 unrelated 4-H Members. Immediate family members may share and ID the same project horse.
- -> Livestock fair entries will be due July 1. *If you have more than 2 animals of the same species per family, let the office know via email coopext_lincoln@mail.colostate.edu if you will be combining pens or need separate pens. You will need to notify the office as well if you will need stalls for breeding animals.
- -> Beef exhibitors-You are required to bring your brand inspection certificates to fair as part of the consignment process of your animal to the sale.
- -> General Projects-> For individuals participating in fair, you must participate in interview judging in person. If you are not available that day your project will not be allowed to place higher than 2nd in it's class. Be sure to read through the fair book for your specific project to ensure you follow the project specifications correctly for exhibition. **Exhibition of 4-H projects at fair is not required for project completion. However, general projects must participate in county fair judging for consideration for state fair qualification. If you do not intend to exhibit your livestock or general project at fair, please let the office know as soon as possible.

- -> A general reminder to download all forms and sheets before typing into forms to ensure that you can save your work. Test the save button on the document as you begin and remember to save frequently.
- -> 4-H green record books are available at the extension office for \$3.50. *Green binders are not required to hold records-just a notebook of some kind. Display boards and clothing tags are also available for \$3.00.
- -> Colorado State Fair information, contests, events, and requirements @ coloradostatefair.com/.
- -> Project Books/Manuals & Updated Information: Families will need to order project books/manuals directly from the supplier. Go to Colorado 4-H @ co4h.colostate.edu/program-areas/colorado-4-h-project-information/ and then click on "publication order form" to see where to download or order manuals.
- -> Download a general project record book @ <u>co4h.colostate.edu/program-areas/colorado-4-h-project-information/</u> for completion requirements and to help you determine what information you need to complete and when. FAIR: RABBIT & POULTRY NOMINATIONS

Market (Rabbits & Poultry) will need to be nominated similar to other livestock species per the sale committee. This form will be due July 1.

The form can be found on the website under "forms and applications" "fair" tab @ <u>lin-coln.extension.colostate.edu/4-h-forms-applications/</u>.

- *Rabbits will need to have an identifying tattoo on their ear. Rabbits need to be tattooed by the nomination form deadline. Fresh tattoos at the fair will result in the disqualification of the animal being shown.
- *All market poultry must be nominated and have a leg band (with a number) placed on them.

Poultry leg bands must be picked up from the Extension Office in time to submit nomination forms. There is a tool available to borrow to apply the leg bands.

FAIR: HORSE & DOG ID'S-> 4H ONLINE

For members interested in showing animals at state fair, the deadline to enter Animal ID's for (Horse and Dog is May 1) in 4H Online.

The Lincoln County Fair Deadline is July 1 (Horse & Dog).

We encourage all members to enter ID's by the May 1 deadline as the system will lock for members to enter information directly. You must submit your Id's directly to coopext_lincoln@mail.colostate.edu after May 1 as 4H Online will lock).

General Instructions:

- -Log in to 4H Online
- -Click "View" next to member's name you are wanting to add an animal ID to
- -Select "Animals" from the left side of the page
- -Click "Add an Animal"
- -Select animal type and start filling in information for that dog or horse. Clear and complete photos of your animal are required for both. Vaccination records are required for dogs. Be sure to accurately and completely add information. If your dog is not registered, put any combination of numbers to bypass the field.
- *Remember that to show an animal at fair it must be ID'd by the deadline.

Scrap Wood-Road Project:

With some scrap wood, paint, and your imagination you can create your own roads, fields, or parking areas to utilize with your farm toys, construction equipment, or matchbox car collection.

Supplies:

- -Hand Saw
- -Tape Measure
- -Pencil
- -Paint (brown, black, white, yellow, and other colors
- -Paintbrushes
- -Sand paper
- -Scrap wood (smaller rectangle or square pieces work best to avoid cutting)

Steps:

- -Always work with an adult to make sure you know how to properly use tools and wear safety glasses and gloves for safety.
- -Look for pieces of scrap wood (or ask a neighbor or family member) that are rectangular or square. They can be short or long pieces. The more variety the better. Avoid pieces that over 3" in width unless you have larger play farm equipment. *For fields consider a larger piece of wood (these could be circular, rectangular, or square).
- -Cut wood to desired lengths and sizes.
- -Use sand paper to sand out larger rough spots and splintered areas.
- -Paint wood on one-side (or both if multiple uses) black (paved roads) or brown (dirt roads). Allow paint to dry.
- -Use white or yellow paint to make lane markers on the road or parking spaces.
- -Let those dry and then match up your pieces of wood to lay out roads and parking areas or fields in your backyard or living room and get to exploring your imagination!



AgNext is working to provide solutions and practical applications for producers especially in the realm of emissions output. This tool helps producers to predict the amount of methane emissions from their dairy cattle. It shows calculations based on current feed and inputs and what happens if producers utilize a methane mitigating feed additive to reduce emissions. This allows producers to see economic costs and values based on current and potential future production practices. HEALTH-> Sunscreen

The sun is with us year-round, but we tend to spend more days out in the sun during the summer months and for longer periods of time than the winter. Protecting your skin against harmful UVA/UVB rays is important to reducing chances for skin cancer and providing overall health to your skin. Chose a sunscreen with a Sun Protection Factor (SPF) greater than 15 that blocks both UVA/UVB rays. Reapply every two hours and after swimming, toweling off, or sweating.

*Don't forget that you are getting exposed to the sun even on cloudy days; when sitting in the shade; or from the reflection of sun rays off glass or water. So always put on the sunscreen!
